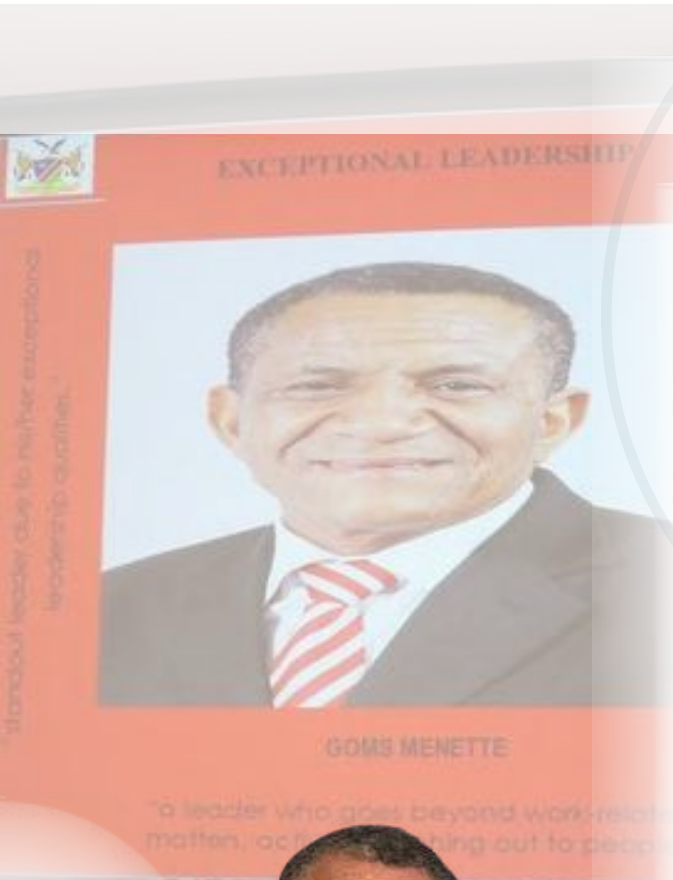

Namibia Hosts Ground-breaking Extractive Industries Workshop Amidst Oil and Gas Revolution

In a significant step forward for Namibia's burgeoning oil and gas sector, the Office of the Auditor-General recently convened a two-day Extractive Industries Workshop at its Head Office.

The vent which took place from the 4th to the 5th of March 2025 in the OAG Auditorium, brought together a diverse group of stakeholders to address the pressing issues surrounding the country's newly discovered oil and gas resources. The workshop was expertly facilitated by Norwegian audit specialists known for their extensive experience in the oil and gas auditing sector.

Since the major offshore discoveries in the Orange Basin that began in 2022, Namibia has positioned itself as a vital player on the global oil and gas exploration stage. In response to these developments, the Government of the Republic of Namibia, through the Ministry of Mines and Energy, has implemented key frameworks designed to protect the interests of both the State and its citizens. The Office of the Auditor-General is actively working to ensure that international companies operating in this vital sector adhere to the established regulatory and governance standards, thereby bolstering accountability and oversight.

As part of this initiative, the Performance and Environmental Audit Directorate engaged with critical stakeholders, including the National Petroleum Corporation of Namibia (NAMCOR) and its international partners, fostering a collaborative environment to exchange best practices in anticipation of managing and overseeing these significant discoveries. The NAMCOR delegation was led by Acting Managing Director, Mr Mtundeni Ndafyaalako, whose insights were instrumental throughout the discussions.

Among the notable participants was Mr Graham Hopwood from the Institute for Public Policy Research (IPPR), who delivered a compelling presentation on governance, transparency, and accountability within Namibia's oil and gas industry. He highlighted the importance of strong governance frameworks at this pivotal point in the sector's development and underscored the essential role of civil society in advocating for accountability in the extractive industry.

In his presentation, Mr Hopwood identified several critical risk areas requiring immediate attention, including the licensing and contracting processes, revenue management, state participation, the national oil company's role, procurement and local content policies, and environmental governance. Furthermore, he outlined transparency priorities from a civil society viewpoint, emphasising the need for responsible management of Namibia's oil and gas resources to benefit the nation in the long run.



Enhancing collaboration to combat illicit financial flows



The Office of the Auditor-General hosted a two-and-a-half-day workshop between 11 and 12 March 2026 to enhance collaboration between Supreme Audit Institutions (SAIs) and Anti-Corruption Agencies (ACAs) to combat illicit financial flows.

This workshop, which took place at Avani, Windhoek, gathered participants from diverse organisations, including the Office of the Auditor-General of Namibia, the Financial Intelligence Centre, the Anti-Corruption Commission, the Bank of Namibia, and the Ministry of Finance. Facilitators from Afrosai-e, along with the Deputy Auditor General of SAI Malawi and legal experts from the Office of the Auditor General of Kenya and Tanzania, contributed to the discussions.

The keynote speaker was GIZ's country manager, Mr Jerry Beaukes, who made several remarks during the SAI ACA Collaboration Workshop in Namibia. He expressed his delight to welcome everyone on behalf of GIZ and the Good Financial Governance in Africa Programme, emphasising the importance of the Multi-Donor Action aimed at fighting tax-related Illicit Financial Flows, co-funded by the EU, Finland, and the German Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, BMZ.

Mr Beaukes extended deep appreciation to the Auditor-General, Junias Etuna Kanjeke and the entire team at the Supreme Audit Institution of Namibia for hosting the event. He stated, "We are indeed delighted to join AFROSAI-E in their pursuit towards strengthening Audit Institutions on the African Continent." He also welcomed peers from SAI Kenya, Malawi, and Tanzania, acknowledging their vital roles in the collaborative efforts.

In discussing the priorities of GIZ, he remarked, "The fight against corruption and IFFs are two of our priority areas," highlighting that illicit financial flows and money laundering hinder the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and African development. He pointed out that these issues drain foreign exchange and reduce domestic resources, exacerbating poverty and inequality.

Mr Beaukes referenced a 2020 UN report indicating that Africa loses nearly \$89 billion annually due to IFFs, which is more than the total development aid received. He candidly noted, "Despite all efforts aimed at countering and fighting the aforementioned, IFFs are still on the rise." He underscored the importance of national Supreme Audit and Anti-Corruption Institutions in combating corruption and money laundering, emphasising their critical role in auditing anti-money laundering policies.

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He further explained that collaboration between internal and external audits increases resilience against these issues and helps close loopholes for IFFs. "What would be a better way to strengthen state finances than through solid auditing and a well-established external control system?" he asked, stressing the need for effective planning and coordination to ensure successful investigations into money laundering.

Throughout the workshop, participants were introduced to the SAI-ACA collaboration framework, shared insights on existing partnerships, and developed a practical action plan to integrate this framework into their respective institutions. The goals of the workshop included bridging the gap between auditing and enforcement, strengthening professional networks, and promoting a coordinated approach to effectively prevent and combat corruption. This initiative represented a vital step toward enhancing accountability and integrity in public financial management.

OAG concludes Annual Planning Workshop with focus on excellence



The Office of the Auditor-General (OAG) successfully concluded its two-day Annual Planning Workshop on 17-18 March 2026, at the OAG Auditorium.

Under the theme "Breakthrough to Excellence," the workshop aimed to review the first year of the Strategic Plan 2025-2030 and to develop an actionable Annual Plan for 2026-2027. The Auditor-General, Mr Junias Etuna Kandjeke, who was also present at the workshop, emphasised the importance of assessing achievements and challenges faced during the initial year of the Strategic Plan.

"As we reflect on our progress, we must ask ourselves if we are merely ticking boxes or truly identifying and addressing the root causes of non-compliance," he stated in his keynote address. Participants engaged in comprehensive discussions focused on several key objectives, including an overview of the previous year's performance, sharing lessons learned, and establishing baselines that would guide the new Annual Plan. The workshop also facilitated alignment among the various directorates, ensuring each area contributed effectively to the Office's main strategy.

This workshop also promoted a strong sense of commitment and ownership among staff, reinforcing their vital role in promoting accountability and protecting the public interest. Mr Kandjeke urged attendees to prioritise support for the Public Accounts Committee (PAC), emphasising the need for clear, accessible reports that empower Parliamentarians to act on audit findings.

"The success of this workshop lies in our collective effort to break through the barriers that may hinder our progress." Mr Kandjeke remarked. "If we can do that today, we will achieve excellence for Namibia tomorrow."

With the workshop now concluded, the OAG looks forward to implementing the strategies and insights gained, ensuring continued excellence in its mandate to uphold accountability within the public sector.

The workshop marks a significant step in the OAG's journey toward enhancing its operations and impact, aligning its goals with national development and public service excellence.

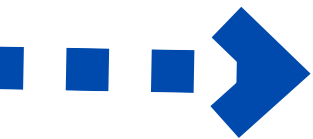

Strengthening Internal Auditing in Namibia and the Public Service



On 21 October 2025, Ms Henriette Kido, the Governor of The Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA), held a stakeholder engagement meeting with the Office of the Auditor-General (OAG).

The primary goal of this meeting was to enhance internal auditing practices in Namibia and across the public service sector. A significant development announced during this engagement was the recognition of Namibia and Mexico as independent national institutes by the Global Federation of Internal Auditors. This independence marks a crucial milestone for IIA Namibia, transitioning it from being a region of IIA South Africa to a standalone institute.

Recognising that a majority of internal auditors work within the public sector, IIA Namibia has proposed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOU) with the OAG. This collaboration aims to raise awareness about internal auditing, build capacity, and develop professional training programs for internal auditors.

The meeting was attended by Deputy Auditor-General, Mr Goms Menette, along with Ms Maxine Hangula, the Director of Government Internal Audit and Policy Coordination in the Ministry of Finance, and Mr Blessing Nyandoro, the Director of Accrual-Based Audits in the Office of the Auditor-General, along with the OAG's internal audit subdivision team.

Mr Menette expressed strong support for the proposed initiatives and emphasised the critical importance of internal auditing in promoting accountability and transparency within the public service.

This collaboration aims to highlight the value of internal auditing and strengthen a more transparent public service in Namibia. Stakeholders are encouraged to work together towards a more promising future in this vital sector.

OAG meets Future Accounting Leaders with **University Engagements**



DID YOU KNOW?

- The Office of the Auditor-General has managed to table one hundred and thirteen (113) audit reports for the 2023/24 financial year, for Local Authorities, O/M/As, SOEs, Funds, and Regional Councils.
- Five (5) Performance Audit reports that have been tabled in the National assembly during the 2023/24 financial year covering the following topics: Service delivery to Orphans and Vulnerable children in Namibia, Management of Environmental Impact Assessments, Management Plans and Clearance Certificates in Namibia, Gender Equality in Governance and Decision making and Economic Empowerment in Namibia.
- The Office increased its audit coverage of the total government expenditure from 66% to 80% over the past two financial years.
- The Office of the Auditor-General will commence an Extractive Industry Audit, namely “Impact of climate resilience/adaptation strategies SDG 2.3 during the 2024/25 financial year.
- The Annual AFROSAI Governing Board Meeting was held in Namibia in 2017.
- The Auditor-General was awarded for “Invaluable Service as Founding Chairperson of AFROSAI-E (2005-2010)” in 2011.
- The Office of the Auditor-General received the Customer Service Award for four consecutive years in the OMAs category (2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024).
- We successfully hosted the 21st Commonwealth Auditors General Conference and other International events.
- On 22 December 2011, the 66th United Nations General Assembly adopted Resolution A/66/209 “Promoting the efficiency, accountability, effectiveness and transparency of public administration by strengthening supreme audit institutions.
- The Office of the Auditor-General achieved notable success at career fairs, winning second place at the 2022 NUST Career Fair and the 2024 CENORED-NUST Career Fair, third place at the 2023 Sanlam-NUST Career Fair, and first place in 2025, all in the ministries, offices, and agencies category.
- Therein, the General Assembly for the first time expressly recognises that Supreme Audit Institutions can accomplish their tasks objectively and effectively only if they are independent of the audited entity and are protected against outside influence.
