REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON THE ACCOUNTS OF THE REGIONAL COUNCIL OF THE KHOMAS REGION FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

1. Report on the Financial Statements

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The accounts of the Khomas Regional Council for the financial year ended 31 March 2015 are being reported on in accordance with provisions set out in the Regional Council Act, 1992 (Act 22 of 1992).

Figures in the report are rounded to the nearest Namibia dollar and deficits are indicated in (brackets).

I certify that I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Khomas Regional Council for the financial year ended 31 March 2015. These financial statements comprise of the following:

Annexure A: Balance Sheet

Annexure B: Income Statement

Annexure C: Cash Flow Statement

Annexure D: Notes to the financial statements

The financial statements were submitted by the Accounting Officer to the Auditor-General in compliance with Section 40(1) of the Regional Council Act, 1992, except that they were only submitted on 14 August 2015 instead of three months (3 months) after the year end as required by the Act.

The financial statements, and general information provided by the Accounting Officer are attached as Annexure A-D.

2. MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Section 39 of the Regional Council Act, 1992 and relevant legislation, and for such internal control as management deemed it necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITY

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on the audit. I conducted the audit in accordance with International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). These standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

Powers and duties

Section 25(1) (c) of the State Finance Act, 1991, provides that the Auditor-General should satisfy himself that:

- (a) All reasonable precautions have been taken to ensure that all monies due to the State are collected, and that the laws relating to the collection of such monies have been complied with;
- (b) All reasonable precautions have been taken to safeguard the receipt, custody and issue of and accounting for, the State's assets, such as stores, equipment, securities and movable goods; and
- (c) The expenditure has taken place under proper authority and is supported by adequate vouchers or other proof.

In addition, Section 26(1) (b) (iv) of the State Finance Act, 1991, empowers the Auditor-General to investigate and report on the economy, efficiency and effectiveness of the use of the State's resources.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control.

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the audit opinion.

4. ACKNOWLEGMENT

The assistance and co-operation given by the management and staff of the Regional Council during the audit is appreciated

5. KEY AUDIT FINDINGS

5.1 Government subsidy and Government Grant

An amount of N\$ 824 774 for Government Subsidy was incorrectly recorded as revenue rather than Retained Income. This amount should have been recognised as revenue in the prior year. In an effort to correct this error in the year under review, the Council incorrectly credited revenue instead of Retained Income. This resulted in overstatement of revenue in the year under review.

Furthermore an amount of N\$ 7 500 000 for Government Grant received was incorrectly recorded as revenue instead of Deferred Income (Capital Project Fund Liability). The Council incorrectly treated capital project funds as operational revenue which resulted in an overstatement of revenue.

Recommendation

The Council is recommended to ensure that transactions are correctly recorded under the relevant class of accounts.

Management response

The amount in question was in fact part of an opening bank balance for the account of Rural Development projects. This account was incorporated in the Council chart of accounts during 2013/2014 financial period however, instead of capturing the closing balance of N\$ 902 345 at 31 March 2014, only an amount of N\$ 77 571 was captured. The Council concur with the auditors that in 2014/2015 the difference of N\$ 824 774 should have been captured under retained income and not under revenue as it is funds received in a prior financial period.

The Council concur that there was a wrong posting with regard to the N\$ 7 500 000. These funds were received from the National Planning Commission for the construction of services at Groot Aub.

5.2 Delegated Functions

Funds amounting to N\$ 647 500 received from the Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare for delegated function purpose were not recorded as revenue. The Council could not trace the entry in the accounting records.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council should ensure that all transactions are correctly accounted for.

Management response

The Council agrees with the finding. The Ministry mistakenly transferred the funds in the Council's bank account instead of the Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare account.

5.3 Park foods Shopping Centre

The Council did not provide all lease contracts of tenants against which revenue was recorded at the value of N\$ 217 609 and corresponding debtors of N\$ 768 906. Therefore, important audit test related to accuracy, completeness and valuation could not be performed.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council provide all supporting documents for auditing purpose.

Management response

The lease contracts of tenants were kept by the Agent, whom during the period under review was the administrator of the Shopping center. The Council has now managed to receive the contracts and they are available for verification at the Khomas Regional Council.

5.4 5% Rates & taxes

Revenue and Accounts Receivables relating to 5% Assessment Rates are both materially misstated by N\$ 1 644 142 due to incorrect revenue recognition.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council should ensure that revenue is correctly recognized.

Management response

The difference as reported is between the amounts paid by the City of Windhoek which is based on the funds received from rates and taxes and what was actually billed to the customers. The City of Windhoek pays the 5% levy based on the amount they collect from the rate payers instead of the billed amount as required by the Act, citing reasons that they cannot pay what they have not received. At the moment this situation is beyond the Council's control. However, it is proposed that a meeting should be arranged between the City of Windhoek, the Khomas Regional Council as well as representatives from the Office of the Auditor General to reach an understanding concerning this issue.

5.5 Interest income

Omission from prior period amounting to N\$ 2 412 579 was wrongly classified in the current year. This amount was supposed to have been recognised as revenue for prior year.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council should ensure that transactions are accounted for in the relevant year of disclosure.

Management response

The amount in question is representing interest accrued on the Directorate of Education bank account. As mentioned by the auditor the said amount was not reflected in the Council's books during the 2013/2014 financial period.

5.6 Value Added Tax

The Council did not submit VAT returns during the year under review. A material difference of N\$ 9 456 901 was noted between the VAT amount disclosed in the financial statement and the Inland Revenue statement.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council should ensure that VAT returns are submitted timeously and should also ensure that correct amounts are disclosed in the financial statements.

Management response

The Council agrees with the finding concerning the non-submission of VAT returns due to misunderstanding concerning the submission of VAT returns and claiming thereof by the Council. The Council in consultation with the Receiver of Revenue are attending to the issue and working on submitting all the outstanding returns to the Receiver of Revenue.

5.7 Unrecorded VAT Liabilities

There were unrecorded liabilities amounting to N\$ 1 516 333 and N\$ 1 300 015 for penalties and interest respectively from the Receiver of Revenue. This is as a result of the Council contravening the VAT Act.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Council disclose all VAT liabilities in the financial statements. VAT returns should be submitted to avoid penalties and interest.

Management response

The Council concur with the finding and confirms that the stated amounts comprises of penalty and interest charged that emanated from the non-submission of VAT returns by the Regional Council as mentioned above. The Council is however not in the position to pay such amount to the Receiver of Revenue due to the tight financial /cash flow situation in the country thus the Council will pursue the route of requesting the Receiver to write off such amounts.

6. BASIS OF ADVERSE AUDIT OPINION

My opinion has been adverse due to the following:

- Incorrect accounting for Government Subsidy amounting to N\$ 824 774;
- Incorrect accounting for Government Grant amounting to N\$ 7 500 000;
- Unrecorded revenue amounting to N\$ 647 500;
- Misstatement of Revenue and Accounts Receivables amounting to N\$ 1 644 142;
- Incorrect accounting of revenue amounting to N\$ 2 412 579;
- A material difference of N\$ 9 456 901 related to VAT receivables;
- Unrecorded VAT penalties amounting to N\$ 1 516 333; and
- Unrecorded VAT Interest amounting to N\$ 1 300 015.

7. ADVERSE OF AUDIT OPINION

The accounts of the Khomas Regional Council for the financial year ended 31 March 2015 have been audited in terms of Section 40(1) of the Regional Council Act, 1992 (Act 22 of 1992).

In my opinion because of the significance of the matters discussed and listed in the Basis for Adverse Opinion paragraph, these annual financial statements do not present fairly the financial position of the Khomas Regional Council as at 31 March 2015 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with basis of accounting applicable to the GAAP and Regional Council Act, Section 34.

REGIONAL COUNCIL OF KHOMAS REGION NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH

1. Accounting Policies

The annual financial statements are prepared in accordance with and comply with Namibian Statements of Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The annual financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention. The following accounting policies are consistent, in all material respects, with those of the previous year.

The annual financial statements are prepared in line with the accruals concept.

All fixed assets are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method to write off the cost of each asset to its residual value over its estimated useful economic life. The estimated useful economic lives for each category of asset are as follows:

Buildings	50 Years
Vehicles	5 Years
Machinery & Equipment	5 Years
Office Equipment	3 Years
Computer Equipment	3 Years
Furniture & Fittings	3 Years

Land and Infrastructure assets are not depreciated. It is assumed that Land will appreciate in value over time, and that infrastructure assets (I.e. water, sewerage and electricity networks) will maintain their value due to the necessity of regular maintenance.

Buildings that are still under construction are classed as Work in Progress, and are not depreciated until the work is fully completed.

2. Revenue and Expenditure

2.1 Government Transfers:

MRLGH&RD

The Council receives administrative grants from the Ministry of Regional, Local Government, Housing & Rural Development. The grants are for the day-to-day operations of the Council. In the current financial year, the council received N\$ 23 000 000 in grants.

2.2 Rates Levy from Local Authorities

The Council per the Local Authorities Act of 2000, Section 76A levies an amount equal to 5 % of the rates levied on all rateable property situated in local authority areas. In the current financial year rates received amounted to N\$ 9 754 530.
