REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON THE ACCOUNTS OF THE REGIONAL COUNCIL OF OTJOZONDJUPA FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ADVERSE AUDIT OPINION

I have audited the financial statements of the Regional Council of Otjozondjupa for the financial year ended 31 March 2019. These financial statements comprise the statement of financial position, statement of comprehensive income, statement of cash flow, statement of changes in equity for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies, and notes to the financial statements.

In my opinion, because of the significance of the matters discussed in the basis for adverse audit opinion paragraph, the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Regional Council of Otjozondjupa as at 31 March 2019 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended.

2. BASIS FOR ADVERSE AUDIT OPINION

I conducted my audit in accordance with International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of my report. I am independent of the entity in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Supreme Audit Institutions together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

An adverse audit opinion is being expressed due to the following reasons:

2.1. FINANCIAL REPORTING FRAMEWORK

The Council did not have a financial reporting framework for the financial year ended 31 March 2019.

2.2. GENERAL EXPENDITURE - NON SUBMISSION

Expenditure payment vouchers amounting to N\$ 4 860 848 were not provided for audit purposes.

2.3. NON-SUBMISSION OF SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS – REVENUE

a) Government subsidy

Supporting documents, including confirmation letters and proof of payments, for a government subsidy totaling N\$ 2 339 738 were not submitted for audit purposes.

b) Income from 5% rates and taxes

Assessment rates statistics for income from 5% rates and taxes amounting to N\$ 3 426 806 were not submitted for audit purposes.

2.4. NON-SUBMISSION FOR CAPITAL PROJECT VOUCHERS – Work In Progress (WIP)

Payment vouchers for capital projects amounting to N\$ 36 469 616 were not submitted for audit purposes.

2.5. VALUE ADDED TAX (VAT) RETURNS

The Council did not submit its VAT returns on time for the year under review. This is in contravention of Section 24(1) of the Value-Added Tax Act, 2000 (Act No.10 of 2000) which states that VAT returns should be submitted not later than the twenty-fifth day of the month following the end of the tax period, whether or not tax is payable in respect of such period. As a result, the Council was penalized with an amount of N\$ 713 500 during the 2019 financial year for not submitting returns on time as required by the Act.

2.6. VALUE ADDED TAX RECONCILIATION

A difference of N\$ 4 169 384 was noted between the VAT receivable as per the financial statements (N\$ 22 349 944) and the VAT returns (N\$ 18 180 560).

2.7. INCOME FROM SETTLEMENT AREAS

Income from settlement areas amounting to N\$ 5 132 812 could not be audited due to the absence of unique reference numbers for transactions, making it challenging to trace each transaction to its corresponding source document.

2.8. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT (PPE)

A difference of N\$ 17 737 767 was noted in the net carrying amount between the fixed asset register (N\$ 27 132 449) and the financial statements (N\$ 9 394 682).

2.9. PHYSICAL VERIFICATION OF PPE

The auditors were unable to verify assets amounting to N\$ 9 392 747 because the identification numbers on the physical assets did not correspond with the unique codes recorded in the fixed asset register.

2.10. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENT

Cash and cash equivalents amounting to N\$ 23 293 816 disclosed in the financial statements could not be verified. Not all the bank statements were provided for audit.

2.11. ANALYSIS OF THE CASH FLOW STATEMENT – PURCHASES OF PPE

The auditors noted a difference amounting to N\$ 7 918 894 between the PPE account performed (N\$ 36 120 602) and the purchases of PPE balance disclosed in the cash flow statement (N\$ 44 039 496).

3. KEY AUDIT MATTERS

Key audit matters are those matters that in my professional judgment were of most significance in my audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of the audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming an audit opinion thereon, and I do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. I have nothing to report in this regard.

4. OTHER INFORMATION

Management is responsible for the other information. The auditor's opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, accordingly, the auditor does not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. I have nothing to report in this regard.

5. RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT AND THOSE CHARGED WITH GOVERNANCE FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with legislation, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Council's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Council or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible of overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

6. AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and to issue a report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions, will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the International Standards for Supreme Audit Institutions, I exercise professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence, obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention to it in the audit report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify the audit opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of the audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during the audit.

• I also provide those charged with governance with a statement that I have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on my independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, I determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. I describe these matters in my report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or, when, in extremely rare circumstances, I determine that a matter should not be communicated in my report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

7. REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

The financial statements were submitted by the Accounting Officer to the Auditor-General in compliance with Section 40(1) of the Regional Council Act, 1992 (Act No. 22 of 1992), except that they were submitted on the 9th November 2021 instead of three (3) months after the year-end as required by the Act.

7.1. PAY AS YOU EARN (PAYE) RETURNS

It was noted that certain PAYE returns were not submitted within the required timeframes as stipulated by the Income Tax Act, 1981 (Act No. 24 of 1981) resulting in non-compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

REGIONAL COUNCIL OF OTJOZONDJUPA REPORT OF THE CHIEF REGIONAL OFFICER

The Regional Council is required to maintain adequate accounting records and is responsible to the content and integrity of annual financial statements and related information included in this report. It is the Regional Council's responsibility to ensure that annual financial statements fairly present the state of affairs of the Regional Council for the year and the results to its operation and cash flows for the period ended in conformity with Namibia's acceptable accounting practice.

The Regional Council acknowledges that it is ultimately responsible for the systems of internal financial control established and places considerable importance of maintaining a strong control environment to enable the Regional Council to meet these responsibilities. The standards a set for internal control are aimed at reducing the risk of error or loss in a cost effective manner. The standards include proper delegation of responsibilities within a clearly defined framework; effective accounting procedure and adequate segregation of duties to ensure an acceptable level of risk. These controls are monitored throughout the Regional Council and all employees are required to maintain the highest ethical standards in ensuring the Regional Council's business is conducted in a manner that in all reasonable circumstances is above reproach. The focus on risk management of the Regional Council is on identifying assessing managing and monitoring all known forms of risk across the Regional Council. While operating risk cannot be fully eliminated the Regional Council endeavours to minimize it by ensuring that appropriate infrastructure control systems and ethical behaviour are applied and managed within the predetermined procedures and constraints.

The Regional Council opinion is based on the information and explanations by the management that the system of internal control provides reasonable assurance that the financial records may be relied on for the preparation of financial statements. However, any system of internal financial control can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatements or losses.

The annual financial statements set out on pages 10 -23 have been prepared in accordance with the provision of Section 39 and 40 of the Regional Councils Act, 1992 (Act No. 22 of 1992) as amended to reflect the true and fair view of financial affairs of Otjozondjupa Regional Council as at 31 March 2019.

1. Accounting convention

The following are the accounting policies of the Regional Council which are consistent in all material respects with those applied in the previous year, except as otherwise indicated. The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The Regional Council processes its transactions on an accrual basis.

Currency

The financial statements are expressed in Namibia Dollars.

Property, plant, and equipment

Property, plant, and equipment (owned or leased) are stated at historical cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line method to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life as follows:

Buildings50 yearsVehicles5 yearsComputer equipment3 yearsOffice equipment3 yearsFurniture and equipment5 yearsMachinery and equipment5 years

Land no depreciation

Revenue

Revenue is recognized in the financial statement at the date the funds are delivered or services are rendered.

Going concern

As the Council continues to monitor and evaluate its operation, the Council still believes it can provide adequate and effective service to the community and region and contribute to the Namibian economy during and beyond its current operation.
